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PROCEEDINGS

MR. RICHARDS: Good morning. My name is David Richards, and I'm pleased to open the first meeting of the Customer Service Advisory Committee. I'm an Associate General Counsel at the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles. For ease of reference, I will refer to this Advisory Committee as CSAC, which is the acronym for this Committee.

It is now 9:03 a.m., and I'm calling the CSAC meeting for September 10, 2021 to order. I want to note for the record that the public notice of this meeting containing all items on the agenda was filed with the Office of Secretary of State on September 1, 2021.

This meeting is being held by telephone conference call in accordance with Texas Government Code Chapter 551.125. Members of the public may physically attend this meeting in person at 4000 Jackson Avenue, Building 1, Lone Star Room, Austin, Texas 78731, or attend this meeting by calling the toll-free number, which is both posted in our agenda, which was filed with the Office of Secretary of State on September 1, 2021.

All Advisory Committee members, including myself, will be participating remotely via telephone conference call today. At this time, will all attendees please mute your phone for the entire duration of this

meeting?

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I'm asking our meeting host to make sure all participants' phones are muted except for Advisory

Committee members and those that are presenting today.

Callers will be removed for any disruption, including background noise.

I would like to remind participants that this is a telephone conference call meeting. Because this meeting is being held by telephone conference call, there are a few things that will assist us in order to ensure the meeting runs smoother and also, very importantly, to assist our court reporter in getting an accurate record of this -- today's meeting.

Comments should be pertinent to the issues stated in your email. When addressing the Advisory Committee, please state your name and affiliation for the record.

Before we begin today, I'd like to remind all presenters and those in attendance of the rules of conduct at our committee meetings. In the Department's rules at 43 Texas Administrative Code Section 206.22, the Presiding Officer is given authority to supervise the conduct of the meetings.

23	over to TxDMV Executive Director Whitney Brewster.

25	MS. BREWSTER: Thank you, David. And good

morning, everyone. Thank you so much for taking the time out of your schedule to join us for the first meeting of our Customer Service Advisory Committee of the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles.

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For those of you who do not know me, my name is Whitney Brewster, and I'm the Executive Director of the Department. Before we continue with introductions and getting to know the members a little bit better, and then on to the important items on the agenda, I wanted to just provide you with some background on the formation of this Committee, before you get started with your important work.

TxDMV went through a review by the Legislature in 2018, affectionately known as the Sunset review, which resulted in the passage of our Sunset bill, SB 604. And there were several recommendations, and of those adopted by the Legislature, one included the establishment of formal advisory committees to assist us, Department staff and the Board, on decision-making and important policymaking decisions.

So often in the past the agency had utilized what I'd consider a more informal process where we gathered feedback. But the TxDMV Board adopted rules surrounding the establishment of advisory committees such as this one, to make sure that there is inclusivity,

transparency in the process, in the policymaking process.

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So all five of our advisory committees have now been established. The Vehicle Titles and Registration Advisory Committee and Consumer Protection Advisory Committees met prior to the last legislative session, and provided some very important input in helping our Department move forward with some of what I consider our more significant initiatives and projects, including protection of motorists' information and data, helping those who acquire the services of household good movers, and deterring fraudulent issuance of temporary tags.

So the Motor Vehicle Industry Regulation

Advisory Committee is also currently working, and they are meeting to consider the temporary tag rules necessary to implement a bill that passed last session, HB 3927.

I have absolutely no doubt that this Committee will provide the same benefits that we are receiving from the other advisory committees, and we really look forward to your input. And this is important because this Committee has some very significant topics to cover, including implementation of Senate Bill 876, which allows vehicle purchasers, owners and dealers the ability to submit title and registration transactions to any willing county in addition to those counties designated in statute.

And that's a significant shift, so we welcome your input and your ideas. We encourage differing viewpoints and debate, and I cannot express enough how appreciative we are for your time on this effort.

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Please -- what I want for members to really know is that our staff and I are here to help with whatever information you might need to make informed decisions. So please do not hesitate to ask. We have access to information from other states and national associations to provide more background and context on the issues that you're -- you may be considering before the Committee.

So in closing, on behalf of the Texas

Department of Motor Vehicles Board and staff, thank you

very much for volunteering your time and your expertise to

helping us with these important issues that will impact

all Texans. And just really appreciate you and your

willingness to give of your time and talents.

So with that, I will -- I'll turn the meeting back over to David, and wish you a very successful meeting. Over to you, David.

MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Whitney. Members, we're going to move on in the agenda to Agenda Item 2(A). This item is the "Purpose, General Information, and Scope of the Advisory Committee."

The purpose of the Customer Service Advisory

Committee is to provide advice and to make recommendations

to the Board and the Department on topics related to

issues affecting motor vehicle industry. You have been -
and customer service. You've been given the charge by the

Department to provide advice and recommendations regarding

this particular issue: implementation of Senate Bill 876.

No other topics will be discussed by this Committee at

this time.

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The Committee provides advice and recommendations only as requested by the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles or our Board. Echoing Whitney's comments, I'd like to congratulate each of you for your appointment to this Committee by the Board, and thank you again for volunteering your precious time to assist the Department and Board on this Committee.

As appointed members of this Committee, you're subject to both the Open Meetings Act and the Texas Public Information Act. The Open Meetings Act provides that all public business should be performed in public view. That means any discussions you have regarding the work you perform with this Committee must be done in a properly scheduled and posted open meeting.

Members of this Committee can violate State law by having a series of discussions on policy issues outside

of the Advisory Committee meetings with others. That is what was referred to as a walking quorum under the Open Meetings Act.

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Advisory Committee members -- or excuse me -- matters with other members outside of the scheduled and posted open meetings. This includes avoiding meeting with other members outside of the properly posted open meeting, not calling members on the phone to discuss Advisory Committee matters, and no using social media to discuss matters that are before the Advisory Committee.

Discussion with other members, even if less than a quorum, outside of a properly posted open meeting for the purpose of secret deliberations can violate the Open Meetings Act, which also carries with it potential criminal penalties.

In addition, information exchanged in your role as an Advisory Committee member can be subject to public disclosure under the Public Information Act, even if that information is in your private email or cell phone. This is because, as an Advisory Committee member, information you have regarding matters brought before the Advisory Committee may also subject to open records laws. Please be aware that any communications you have regarding this Committee may be required to be disclosed in response to

an open records request from the public.

And finally, in order to ensure that the

Advisory Committee meetings run smoothly, advisory

committees select a Presiding Officer. The Presiding

Officer is in charge of making sure that Robert's Rules of

Order are followed to keep proper decorum in the meeting.

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Presiding Officer will open the meeting, much as I did today, and ensure that a quorum of members is present. Presiding Officer makes sure that members make motions and second the motion before voting, and makes sure that no member has the floor longer than others wishing to provide input to the Committee.

We'll be happy to provide some overview training on the mechanics of Robert's Rules of Order to anyone wanting to volunteer to be the Presiding Officer of this Committee, to ensure that it runs efficiently in carrying out its stated purpose.

Some examples on how Robert's Rules of Order are used to run meetings include the following. No member can speak twice to the same issue until everyone else wishing to speak has spoken on it once. All remarks by members must be directed to the Presiding Officer prior to speaking.

You obtain the floor by raising your hand or

asking the Presiding Officer for the floor or the right to speak on a matter only when the person speaking has finished. It is important to not interrupt or -- and share the right to speak with other -- and to share the right to speak with all other members.

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Remarks must be courteous and members must avoid referring to viewpoints by alluding to other members by name or by suggested motives. As members of the Advisory Committee, you expect your Presiding Officer to protect your right to speak, even if it turns out that you're a minority of one in your opinion.

Presiding Officer helps to ensure that other members hear you out and allows you the same amount of time as everyone else. This encourages members to give your fellow members the rightful turn to talk. Listen to all the discussion and your other members, your fellow members. You may hear something that affects your -- you know, your way that you're thinking on a given issue.

Lastly, while we're recording this meeting, before you speak, once again, please state your name very clearly and slowly for the record, and so we can get a record of everything that was said.

If there are no questions on this background information on how the meeting is to run, I'm going to move on to Agenda Item 2(B).

14	member of the Committee? You're just Presiding Officer
15	for this meeting?
16	MR. RICHARDS: Yes, I am.
17	MR. AMES: Okay. And then secondly, on Item
18	1(B)
19	MR. RICHARDS: Uh-huh?
20	MR. AMES: it said, "Welcoming Remarks by
21	Ms. Brewster and Introduction of Advisory Committee
22	Members."
23	MR. RICHARDS: Uh-huh?
24	MR. AMES: I know we did a roll call, but I did
25	not hear an introduction. There's many members on this

Committee that I am unfamiliar with, and I know that we 1 received a document from Ms. Harris, but -- with some 3 bios, but there was only two of them on there. 4 MR. RICHARDS: And to your point, we're going 5 to take that up right now. 6 MR. AMES: Oh, perfect. Thank you, sir. 7 MR. RICHARDS: As part of 2(B). Yeah. 8 MR. AMES: Okay. Sorry. 9 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you for your questions. 10 Uh-huh. No, not at all, not all. We're going to move on to 2(B), "Nominations 11 and Selection of Advisory Committee Presiding Officer." 12 13 Again, for the record, my name is David Richards. I'm an 14 Associate General Counsel of the Texas DMV. 15 Texas law requires an advisory committee to 16 select a Presiding Officer from its members. Presiding 17 Officer will preside over the Advisory Committee and 18 report to the Texas DMV and to our Board. So to Member Ames' point, let's -- each member 19 20 introduce themselves, and you know, provide some background information, and finally, state whether you're 21 22 interested in serving as the Presiding Officer. And I'm 2.3 just going to go down the membership list that I have. 24 Member Aliu, would you please state your name

for the record, give us a little bit of background

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information, and also let us know if you'd be willing to 1 serve as Presiding Officer. I'll turn it over to you. 3 MS. ALIU: Yes. Thank you. My name is Billie 4 Aliu, for the record, and it's a privilege to be a part of 5 this Customer Service Advisory Committee for the Texas 6 Department of Motor Vehicles. I am -- I have over 40 7 years of experience in HR. I started out 15 years in the aerospace 8 9 industry, then moved into health care, where I've spent 10 another 15 years, and now I've been in oil and gas for the 11 last 13 years. I'm currently the Senior HR Manager for 12 Samsung Engineering America here in Houston, Texas. 1.3 I am married and I have three beautiful 14 grandchildren, which are my -- it's my hobby, if you will, 15 along with fishing. And right now, I really need to know 16 what the roles of a presiding officer would be before I 17 could even commit to that for right now. 18 Thank you very much. 19 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Member Aliu. 20 I'm going to move on to Member Ames. Say 21 something about your background. Tell us a little bit 22 about yourself, and also whether or not you'd like to 2.3 serve as Presiding Officer. Thank you. 24 MR. AMES: Well, good morning. Welcome,

everybody. I am John R. Ames, and I am the Dallas County

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Tax Assessor-Collector.

I was just elected to my fourth term in office, and I actually took office as the Tax Assessor before the DMV was even a State agency. I have -- experiencing about 26 years in property tax collections, and for the last 13 years have been the Tax Assessor-Collector here in Dallas. I'm married with two children, two teenagers, so prayers are certainly accepted at any time.

And I would be happy to be the Presiding Officer if that is the will of the body.

MR. RICHARDS: Thank you very much, Member Ames.

Did Member Carter join us? Member Carter?

(No response.)

MR. RICHARDS: Hearing nothing, Member Cavender, could you do the same, please, sir?

MR. CAVENDER: Good morning, everybody. My name is Rick Cavender, for the record. I am the current dealer principal for Audi Dominion in San Antonio, Texas.

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I am a third-generation member of a family that began at Cavender Oldsmobile 81 years ago. Our Cavender Auto family now comprises 12 franchises in San Antonio, Cedar Park, Austin, which is North Austin, Columbus, Texas, and Weimar.

And we're soon to have six luxury stores in Lubbock and Midland, to add to our collection. And then future time, probably first quarter 2023, a beautiful new Subaru store, the largest in the country, in South Austin, right there at I-35 and Buda. So we're excited about that.

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I am a past chairman for the Texas Automobile Dealers Association, where I worked on the -- protecting the voice and listening to over 1,300 franchise car dealers in the state. I'm also the past chairman, twice, for the San Antonio Auto Dealers Association here.

And as far as Presiding Officer, I just don't know if I'd have the time for that, so I'll probably put a soft no in front of you. Personally, I am the father of two beautiful daughters, wife of 40 years married, and a musician by second trade with the Rick Cavender Band that plays here in San Antonio and around Texas.

It's nice to be on this Committee and I look forward to our association together.

MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Member Cavender, and welcome.

Member Daugbjerg?

MR. DAUGBJERG: Good morning. Yeah. My name is Brian Daugbjerg. I grew up in Houston, Texas, and went to Baylor University, and now I'm in Longview.

We've been here for, gosh, over 20 years, and 1 2 run and own a family-owned scrap metal recycling business. 3 And we have a fleet of eight to 10 trucks at any given 4 time. 5 And I just appreciate this group and the work 6 that it's going to do, and I'll turn it back over. 7 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Member Daugbjerg. 8 Sorry for mispronouncing your name. Welcome. 9 Member Drake? Member Drake, have you joined 10 us? MR. DRAKE: Yeah, I hope so, if you can hear me 11 Using a different mic. 12 now. 13 MR. RICHARDS: Yes. Go ahead. 14 MR. DRAKE: Okay. Yes. Tom Drake. I'm with 15 Auto Data Direct. 16 Been involved with the towing industry here in 17 Texas, primarily, for the last 12 years. We provide electronic access to DMV databases, including Texas. 18 19 located in Rockdale, Texas. 20 We also in our business have very extensive 21 memberships and relationships in the dealer industry, and 22 also work closely with the salvage yards here in Texas. 23 And presently, I don't think I'm interested in the 24 Presiding Officer position.

And thank you.

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MR. RICHARDS: Thank you very much, Member 1 Drake, and welcome. 2 Member Duncan, are you with us? 3 4 (No response.) 5 MR. RICHARDS: Oh, actually, I believe I got a 6 note that Member Duncan could not be here today. Member Gaston? 7 8 MR. GASTON: Yes. My name is Christopher 9 Gaston, for the record. I am located here in Houston, 10 I have about 20 years of experience of various title roles with car dealerships and also independent 11 12 title companies. 13 I also -- I currently run a title company in 14 South Houston, Texas, working mostly with dealers, and I'm 15 also a customer of ADD, the guy that presented right 16 before me. And I am not able to be a Presiding Officer at 17 this time. MR. RICHARDS: Wonderful. Thank you, Member 18 19 Gaston, and welcome. 20 Member Gonzalez? 21 MR. GONZALEZ: Yes. Good morning. My name is 22 Ruben Gonzalez. I am the current County -- El Paso County 2.3 Tax Assessor-Collector. 24 I have approximately 44 years of administrating 25 the title and registration laws here in Texas. I retired

from the Texas DMV/TxDOT with 38 years of service, and 1 I've been the Tax Collector six years. 3 I am interested in just being a resource, not being a chair member -- Presiding Officer at this time. 4 5 So I think I'm better suited as a resource outlet than 6 being able to preside and travel to Austin at this time. 7 Thank you very much. MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Member Gonzalez, and 8 9 welcome to you as well. 10 Member Hayter, are you on the call? Member Hayter, are you on the call? 11 12 (No response.) 13 MR. RICHARDS: Okay. I want to move on. 14 Member Hoyt? 15 MS. HOYT: Good morning. My name is Kristen 16 I am the Tax Assessor-Collector for Comal County. 17 I just started in January. I was elected last year. I'm originally from Georgia. I graduated from 18 19 the University of Georgia. Following graduation, I 20 married my husband. 21 We have a tourism-driven business in New 22 Braunfels, Texas, so my background is in customer service 2.3 experience and working with the general public. I have 24 two children.

And I'm happy to serve wherever needed,

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probably not as the position you're in now. But happy to 1 be of help and honored to be on this Committee. 3 you. Thank you very much, Member 4 MR. RICHARDS: 5 Hoyt, and welcome to you as well. 6 Member King? Is Member King with us? 7 (No response.) Member Palacios? 8 MR. RICHARDS: 9 MR. PALACIOS: Yes. Hello. This is Stephen 10 Palacios. I'm currently a Chief Deputy here at the Bexar 11 County Tax Office in San Antonio. 12 My background previously -- I was -- I've been 13 here for eight years at the Tax Office. I was almost 30 14 years in the health care industry with both health plans 15 and large, multi-specialty clinics as the CFO in a couple 16 of the large clinics here in San Antonio. 17 I've got two boys and four granddaughters. that's about it. I'm not at this time -- currently not 18 19 interested in being an officer. 20 Thank you. 21 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you very much, Member 22 Palacios, and welcome. 2.3 Member Peace? 24 MS. PEACE: Hello. My name is Melissa Peace. 25 I have over 20 years in transportation -- in the

transportation industry. I have three boys, and I live 1 south of Dallas, Texas. I would be happy to serve on the Board. 3 MR. RICHARDS: As the Presiding Officer, you're 4 5 saying? 6 MS. PEACE: No, sir. 7 MR. RICHARDS: Oh, okay. 8 MS. PEACE: Anything but that. 9 MR. RICHARDS: Okay. Great. Thank you very 10 much, Member Peace, and welcome. IT, could you unmute call-in user 28 to 11 determine if that's Member Hayter, please? Next, I'm 12 13 going to move on to Member Stidham. 14 Member Stidham? MR. STIDHAM: Yes. Hi. I'm Bruce Stidham. 15 16 I'm the Grayson County Tax Assessor-Collector. I began my 17 third term this past January. I'm also a member of the Tax Assessor-County 18 19 Association board of directors, and I am pleased to be a member of this Committee. Look forward to it very much. 20 21 I've been married for -- it will be 39 years 22 next month to my best friend, Karen. We have two great 2.3 sons, two wonderful, beautiful daughters-in-law, and four 24 great-grandkids, and number five is on the way in

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November.

And I don't think I would be interested in 1 2 serving as chairman of this board. I am also 3 president-elect of our association. But I'm happy to be 4 of service wherever I can. 5 MR. And it's an honor to be 17 on the Committee, and I am at this time not interested on being any position on the Board, but I will help out 18 19 wherever I can. 20 Thank you. 21 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you very much, Member 22 Sutton, and welcome to you. 2.3 Member Wagner? 24 MR. WAGNER: Good morning. Ford Wagner here. 25 I'm glad to be here, number one. Thank you very much.

I actually was born and raised in San Antonio, 1 2 I currently reside in New Braunfels, and have for 3 quite some time. I'm in the trucking business. I have been all 4 5 of our life in the logistics and trucking, transportation. 6 Thirty-five years of my life has been as an owner of a 7 trucking company here in San Antonio. We do provide transportational logistics to the 8 9 automobile industry, such as the Cavender family. For the 10 past 25 years, I've been involved in the towing and 11 recovery industry alongside of the auto transport 12 industry. 1.3 I do serve on the board of the Texas Towing and 14 Storage Association. My responsibility is training and 15 education. I have several people across the state that 16 actually do eight-hour classes for continuing education 17 for tow truck drivers. I'm happy to be a part of this. I do not have 18 19 the time or the bandwidth to be on the Board. 20 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Member Wagner, and welcome as well. 21 22 I want to check real quick. Call-in user 28, 2.3 is that Member Hayter? 24 MR. HAYTER: Yes, sir. 25 MR. RICHARDS: Wonderful. Would you like to

give a little background information regarding yourself
and whether or not you'd like to serve as Presiding

Officer to this group, please? Thank you.

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We're going to now move on to Agenda Item 2(E), "Recommendations of Advisory Committee for Presentation to the Board" and the Department. Just a briefing item. And this essentially states that our DMV rule on advisory committees allow for the Committee to make recommendations to the Board and to the Department. In that respect, the Presiding Officer of CSAC or the Presiding Officer as designee may at some time or may appear before the Board to present those items that result from the meetings of this Committee and if requested by the Board.

All righty. We're going to move on to the more substance and less housekeeping item on this agenda. It's Agenda Item 2(F), "Implementation Plan for Advisory Committee Recommendations."

At this time, I will now turn the meeting over to Roland Luna, Sr., Director of the Texas Department of Motor Vehicle Titles and Registration Division, who will lead the discussion on the implementation of Senate Bill 876.

Roland?

MR. LUNA: Good morning, David, and thank you very much. Good morning, Committee members. Welcome to

the Customer Service Advisory Committee. My name is Roland D. Luna, Sr., and I'm of the Vehicle Titles and Registration Division.

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Today, the VTR, Vehicle Titles and

Registration -- today, the VTR Division will work through
the Implementation Plan associated with SB 876, Senate

Bill 876. We recognize the importance of SB 876 and
understand the way this law impacts business, the way
business is conducted. And for that reason, we initiated
conversations, coordination and planning for SB 876 long
ago.

We have several members of the VTR management team that will discuss the major components associated with the Implementation Plan, and ask Committee members to allow VTR staff to work through the presentation and reserve your questions until the end. There will be plenty of time for us to discuss the components of the Implementation Plan. You can find the document on page 11 of your Committee packet.

And I'll now turn it over to our Deputy Director of VTR, Clint Thompson.

MR. THOMPSON: Yeah. Good morning. Clint
Thompson, Deputy Director of Vehicle Titles and
Registration Division. Thank y'all for joining us this
morning.

I'm going to briefly take a look at the Senate Bill 876 changes. I know Executive Director Brewster already hit on the major change, but I wanted to make sure everybody is operating from the sheet of music, as we've moved forward and have VTR management team discuss the ongoing implementation efforts after that.

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So today, a title application can be submitted to the purchaser's county, seller's county or lienholder's county, or in the event that the purchaser's county of residence is closed, any willing county can process the title application today. The processing county, if it is the statutory county, which y'all will hear us refer to, i.e., the purchaser's county, seller's county or lienholder's county, keeps the fees associated with the title application.

In the event that the purchaser's county of residence is closed, statute does provide for compensation to the processing county in the form of the county portion of the title application fee, as well as the processing and handling fee. The remaining fees go to the county of residence, other than the sales tax today.

As far as SB 876 impacts this, there's no change to the statutory counties that are required to process title applications, again, the purchaser's county, seller's county or lienholder's county. But SB 876 does

remove the provision that we refer to as county closure.

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No longer does the purchaser's county of residence have to be closed for any other county to process a transaction. SB 876 does allow for any willing county to process a transaction at any time. There is that same fee allowance for the willing county.

When processing a transaction, they will retain the county portion of the processing and handling fee, as well as the county portion of the title fee. When a willing county is processing title application, all other fees that are due to the county, including sales tax, are credited to the purchaser's county of residence.

As far as registration transactions today, registration renewal can be completed in the owner's county of residence. There is also a county closure provision. Today, in the event the owner's county of residence is closed, any willing county may process that transaction.

And again, the willing county, in the event of the owner's county of residence being closed, retains the county portion of the processing and handling fee. And the remaining county fees go to the owner's county of residence.

Like with the title application fees, SB 876, it removes the county closure provisions. So owners can

now renew their registration in their county of residence, or they can opt to renew their registration in any county willing to process. And the same fee structure exists for the willing county to retain the county portion of the processing and handling fee.

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Those are the main changes associated with Senate Bill 876. We're going to discuss the various implementation tasks associated with it: programming, rulemaking -- Roland mentioned -- coordination, communication. And keep in mind as we discuss these, all of these activities are running in parallel.

You will see through the presentation that

Title and Registration Services are working hand in hand
on this effort, along with Regional Services Section. And
also you'll see collaboration with other divisions
throughout the Department, since there is significant
impact.

And at this time, I will pass it to Kimberly Jaso to discuss the programming effort.

MR. AMES: Mr. Thompson, this is John Ames.

Can I ask a clarifying question at this time?

MR. THOMPSON: Yes.

MR. AMES: Okay. You stated that there's no change to the title processing. The county will still accept the title for the seller, buyer or our county of

finance, unless there's another willing county. And if there is a willing county, then they would process it and the sales tax would go back to the purchaser's county or the county of origin for the buyer, right?

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MR. THOMPSON: That's right. The willing county processes the title application and the sales tax and other related county fees other than the processing and handling portion of the county fee, and the title application fee will go back to the purchaser's county of residence.

MR. AMES: Okay. So I understand that portion.

If a buyer purchases in the county that it was sold in,

do those fees still go back to the buyer's original

county?

MR. THOMPSON: So it goes to the processing county. So those -- the purchaser's county, the seller's county or the lienholder's county are what we refer to as the statutory counties.

Those counties are required to process title applications based on submission by the purchaser. Since they're statutorily required to process those transactions, like they do today, they will retain those fees.

MR. AMES: Thank you, sir, for the clarification.

1	MR. THOMPSON: Yes, sir.
2	MR. RICHARDS: I see another hand up. Member
3	Gonzalez, do you have a question? Your hand is up.
4	MR. GONZALEZ: No, sir. I need to remove it.
5	I had a question in the previous conversation. Sorry.
6	MR. RICHARDS: Okay, okay. Thank you.
7	MR. STIDHAM: Clint, this is Bruce Stidham in
8	Grayson County. May I ask a question?
9	MR. RICHARDS: Yes, sir.
10	MR. THOMPSON: Yes, sir.
11	MR. RICHARDS: Go ahead.
12	MR. STIDHAM: Okay. Part of the discussion in
13	my office has been when we accept the processing of title
14	or sale from a resident from outside the county, how were
15	those fees that go back to the county handled? Will they
16	be handled internally by our county, where we would have
17	to send a check to the other county? Or will that be done
18	internally through RTS?
19	MR. THOMPSON: Clint Thompson, Deputy Director
20	of Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. So the fees
21	themselves we'll get into this in the program. The
22	fees themselves will not be changed from the county
23	closure functionality today.
24	I think we're going to highlight that a little
25	bit here in the discussion and programming, but basically,

it will be handled by RTS, and there will be credits and 1 debits akin to what we see with county closure 3 functionality. 4 And again, I appreciate the questions, but if 5 y'all would please allow us to go through the programming 6 and rulemaking and whatnot, and then we can -- specific 7 questions about implementation --8 MR. STIDHAM: All right. Thank you, sir. 9 MR. THOMPSON: Yeah, absolutely. 10 MR. RICHARDS: Clint, before we move on, see Member Hayter's hand up? Member Hayter, do you have a 11 12 question? 1.3 MR. HAYTER: No. I think that was left over. 14 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, sir. 15 Clint, go ahead. Please proceed. 16 MR. THOMPSON: Clint Thompson, Deputy Director 17 of Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. I'm through with my portion. I will pass it to Kimberly Jaso. 18 19 you. 20 Good morning, everyone. My name is MS. JASO: 21 Kimberly Jaso. I am the Programming Supervisor for Title 22 Services. 2.3 And as you know, we've already started 24 discussing a large part of the implementation tasks for SB 25 876, including programming to the Department's automated

systems. And for this bill specifically, that's going to impact our Registration and Title System that we refer to as RTS, our webDEALER application and our webSUB application.

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So I just wanted to kind of give a high-level overview of what the systems do and their purpose and who uses them, so those that are not familiar with them can understand as we talk through this process. So as far as RTS goes, that's our Department's primary system that's used by both internal staff and county tax assessor-collector offices for processing various title and registration-related transactions. Some of those transactions include, but aren't limited to, title transfers and registration renewals.

Another part that we just touched on that RTS is responsible for is managing the funds reporting and remittance for the funds that are collected as a result of the transactions that are processed within that system.

Our webDEALER application is a web-based application that's used by licensed motor vehicle dealers and commercial plate buyers, and they use this to electronically submit title application to county tax assessor-collector offices for review and approval.

Once those title applications are approved by the county offices is -- once those are approved, those

transactions are updated in our Registration and Title

System so that those vehicle records reflect the latest
information. And counties also then will reconcile any
funds that are remitted for those transactions in RTS.

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webSUB is a web-based application as well, and that is used by limited service deputies, or what we often refer to them as subcontractors. And that includes entities such as grocery stories that process registration renewals only. And they submit those transactions to the county tax assessor-collector for approval through webSUB as well, and again, once those transactions are approved by the county offices, the vehicle records are updated in our Registration and Title System, and the counties use RTS to reconcile the funds that are remitted for those transactions.

So the Vehicle Titles and Registration

Division, VTR, we've been actively working with our

Information Technology Services Division, as well as other divisions within the Department since mid-June to discuss the impact of this bill, SB 876, and how it impacts both our systems, and you know, the programming efforts and requirements that are going to be necessary to streamline this process for the end users.

So with that, I'm going to pass it over to Romeo McCain, so he can provide us some more specifics

about those programming efforts. Romeo?

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MR. McCAIN: Thank you, Kimberly. Good morning, everyone. For the record, my name is Romeo McCain, and I am the Program Supervisor for Registration Services.

I'll be speaking to you today regarding ongoing Department efforts to programmatically implement the requirements of Senate Bill 876. As Kimberly mentioned, you know, we've been working on this implementation of Senate Bill 876 since mid-June, and the Department has, you know, various divisions that have come together in numerous requirement-gathering sessions to ensure that we are looking at this in a discussion that is very in-depth, right.

We want to make sure we're exhausting all opportunities prior to development. So during these sessions, a large portion of that time has been used not only to take into consideration the changes needed in our system, but also taking heavy consideration into how these changes impact everyday transactions that are processed by county tax offices and dealerships.

So we are identifying ways for our systems, as Kimberly touched on, RTS, webDEALER, webSUB -- we're looking for ways for our systems to programmatically determine and distinguish between what is a statutory

county and what will be a willing county, rather than having a county clerk or a dealership clerk check a box or make a determination manually on the fly while they're attempting to process the transaction. So based on what we feel is a very important requirement need, we anticipate RTS identifying this functionality on its own.

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Part of the automatic system identification program that we've been working on includes things like adding an address validation component, directly within RTS and webDEALER, which would determine the appropriate resident county for the particular transaction. Other things would include additionally programming of -- changing of RTS requirements in terms of fees, how to correctly calculate those fees and accurately reflect those funds on applicable reports.

So you know, again, we're looking for ways to leverage what we're able to do and make it internal, so there's very little to none manually required by the person processing the transaction. So not are we only looking — not only are we looking for ways to update our system, we're looking for areas of our system that may in fact need to be removed to improve the program functionality that is needed as a result of Senate Bill 876.

For example, as Deputy Director Clint Thompson mentioned earlier, as some of you may be aware, there is existing county closure functionality within RTS. This county closure functionality has been used in instances when the county of residence is unable to process a transaction, and a customer needs to visit a neighboring county, for example, to complete their transaction needs.

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As a result of our requirements-gathering thus far, we've determined that RTS county closure functionality is, in fact, no longer applicable as a result of Senate Bill 876. And we're looking to possibly remove that, or in fact -- not possibly, but I believe we are going to end up removing that functionality.

Now, with this county closure functionality being removed, we're certainly going to look to leverage existing system components like -- that go with the county closure functionality, like those used to ensure that funds are distributed appropriately and don't require, as a member mentioned earlier, the county to transfer funds independently.

All in all, you know, our approach -- we're thinking this thing through from all angles, from a county and dealer perspective, from a transaction level, to ensure that our systems are responsible for the heavy lifting, and determining what a willing county is in a

specific transaction. Our goal is to have minimal impact to the end user.

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I would just like to reiterate that, you know, we're continuing to work through implementation and programming requirements, and consideration is being given to all program options that will assist in streamlining this process for everyone involved.

With that being said, I'd like to pass to Lisa Resendez, the Title Services Section Director, to discuss the administrative rule requirement component that is involved with Senate Bill 876.

MS. RESENDEZ: Good morning. Thank you, Romeo. This is Lisa Resendez, Section Director of Title Section of the Vehicle Title Registration. I was going to provide an overview of the process to adapt the rules necessary to implement Senate Bill 876.

A rule team has been established that is comprised of multiple divisions who have been engaged for the last few months, identifying necessary rule changes. We continue to work through the drafting process to identify all necessary changes and currently anticipate the proposal for public comments in the winter of 2021.

The public comment period lasts for 30 days, at the end of which the Department responds to comments received and makes any necessary changes to the proposed

rules based on those comments. Afterward, the rules must be presented to the Board for adoption, which is scheduled to occur before March 1, 2022, which is the effective date of the bill.

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Senate Bill 876 doesn't specify mandate rulemaking, so most of the changes are merely necessary to conform the rules to the provisions of the bill. One of the larger changes is to remove the county closure provisions, which currently triggers the ability for a title or registration transaction to be processed outside of the statutorily-required counties and incorporating that any willing county can process a title or registration transaction.

in a private party sale or a dealer selling a vehicle the option to apply for the title in the purchaser's, seller's or lienholder's county, or any willing county, to process the title application. It also gives a vehicle owner the option to renew registration to their county of residence or any willing county to process a registration renewal.

And with that, that concludes my portion of Senate Bill 876 implementation presentation. I would like to pass it over to Section Director Stefan Krisch to discuss the recurring meetings to discuss implementation of Senate Bill 876. Thank you.

MR. KRISCH: Good morning. My name is Stefan Krisch, Section Director of Registration Services with the VTR Division.

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The Department is committed to our partnership with the tax assessor-collectors of Texas and highly value their opinion and feedback. Therefore, each month, the Department hosts a touch-point meeting with members of the Tax Assessor-Collector Association, including Ms. Michelle French from Denton County, Mr. Shay Luedeke from Bell County, Mr. Randy Riggs from McLennan County, and Ms. Donna Willis from Lynn County.

TxDMV representation includes executive

leadership and members of the Government and Strategic

Communication Division, Information Technology Services

Division, the Office of General Counsel, and the Vehicle

Title and Registration Division. The purpose of the

meeting is to have open discussion about any changes,

opportunities or challenges that could affect the tax

assessor community.

Conversations about Senate Bill 876 were being held with this group long before the bill was passed, and continue to be discussed, most recently on August 25. The information gleaned in those sessions and in future sessions is and will be taken into consideration, as we work through implementation tasks. We look forward to

continuing to partner with the tax assessors in this forum and the invaluable perspective and information that is obtained.

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Now, I'll pass the mic to Tony Hall to discuss our communication strategy.

MR. HALL: Good morning, everybody. Tony Hall, Assistant Section Director, Regional Services. Just to provide y'all a brief overview of communications -- for those of y'all, obviously, that are with the county tax offices, y'all are going to be familiar with this.

Once we get towards the implementation of programming for the Registration and Title System, webDEALER, webSUB, any other impacted systems, we'll put out the release notes. The release notes will obviously contain all the technical processing, instructions, screen changes, all those items we've documented in those release notes.

The Title Services and Registration Services

Sections will also identify any policy- or procedurerelated changes, as is our standard. Any policy- and
procedure-related changes will be documented and detailed
in what we refer to as RTBs, or Registration and Title
Bulletins.

In conjunctions with those Registration and Title Bulletins, we host webinars typically the following

week. At a minimum, there will be two. Depending on the necessity, there may be additional ones, and those will be the opportunity for the subject matter experts from Title and Registration Services to discuss those policy and procedure changes and facilitate Q and A with the impacted stakeholders.

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Those two sections will also identify any potential changes to both VTR-related forms, as well as the e-learning modules. So the e-learning modules are those modules that are required to be taken by tax assessor-collector staff, depending on the permissions that they have for processing transactions in the Registration and Title System.

When those changes are identified and subsequently made, we send out standard communications to notify the impacted stakeholders. Typically, those are county tax assessor-collectors. In the case of forms, likely will be other stakeholders, such as the dealer community, that is impacted, to notify them that forms have been revised, what the acceptability is of previous versions of forms, and encouragement to use the newly-revised forms, specific to the e-learning modules.

Those are only going to impact county tax assessor-collector. And those communications will go out to advise them if any of those changes are of a

substantive nature that's going to require their users that have associated permissions to need to retake those.

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In addition to that, our regional managers out in the field -- there are 17 of them -- they have assigned county tax assessor-collectors, leading up to and post-implementation. As our managers conduct their standard county tax assessor-collector office visits, they will cover this particular topic and any associated RTBs with them at that time, and they'll also be available for various meetings which may go on their regions, such as regional tax assessor-collector association meetings. And again, that all -- you know, around that time period, once we have that information ironed out.

That concludes the overview for the communications plan. So with that, I'm going to turn it back over to Roland Luna.

MR. LUNA: Thank you very much, Tony. Roland Luna, VTR Division Director. Committee members, those other guests that are joining us by telephone, as you can see, this is very complex and this is very in-depth, which is why we wanted to lay out all of the components that are a part of the Implementation Plan. We understand the impact to businesses, to our business, I should say.

And with that, I want to open it up to any of the Committee members for any discussion that you may have

about one of the components of our Implementation Plan. 1 2 MR. AMES: Mr. Luna, this is John Ames, Dallas 3 County Tax Assessor. First of all, I just want to say, 4 thank you for the thoroughness of you and your team to 5 explain how Senate Bill 876 will react, and what the items 6 are that you're putting in place. 7 On behalf of county tax assessors, I have to 8 say, we appreciate that you're trying to automate the 9 process. I think that will benefit not only our teams, 10 but also the public that we serve. So we appreciate it and look forward to discussing this further. 11 MR. LUNA: Yes, sir. Thank you very much, 12 13 John, and it's always good to talk to you. I know that 14 we're talking in a virtual environment -- Roland Luna, VTR 15 Division Director, for the record. But it's always good 16 to visit with you. 17 MR. AMES: Thank you, sir. MR. RICHARDS: Members -- David Richards, for 18 19 the record -- are there any other questions or comments 20 for Mr. Luna and his staff? Please raise your hand or ask for the floor. 21 22 (No response.) 2.3 MR. RICHARDS: No other questions or comments 24 at this time?

MR. AMES: Mr. Richards, if I may clarify?

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This is John Ames again, Dallas County. 1 2 MR. RICHARDS: Absolutely, Member Ames. 3 ahead. MR. AMES: What would the role of this 4 5 Committee be in the implementation of this? Are we simply 6 asking the Committee members to review what you've 7 proposed and agree with it, make recommendations, 8 pinpoint, you know, hardships? 9 MR. RICHARDS: Member Ames, all of the above. 10 We value this Committee's expertise and input. So all of the above, we would be hoping to receive. 11 12 MR. AMES: Thank you, sir. 13 MR. LUNA: Mr. Richards, Roland Luna, VTR 14 Director. 15 MR. RICHARDS: Go ahead, Roland. 16 MR. LUNA: Thank you, sir. John, Roland Luna. 17 I -- one of the things that we hope to accomplish with this initial Advisory Committee meeting is to inform 18 19 Committee members and all interested parties that we're 20 working on the implementation, which is why we wanted to 21 make sure that we had our technical experts, our 22 management staff, as well as our executive leadership and 2.3 Ms. Brewster, be a part of this Advisory Committee to let 24 you know we're moving, we're developing, we're

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progressing.

And when we're at a point where we have additional information to share with the Committee, whether it's with programming or with rule development or any briefing items that we have with our standing monthly meetings with TACA, we want to visit with this Committee about, so that there is not only awareness but -- so some feedback and some direction can be provided from the Committee.

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MR. AMES: Thank you, Mr. Luna. This is John Ames again. I do see that we are meeting again next week, on Wednesday the 15th, and the only real item on that is this bill. Will there be additional information in the next five days that we'll need to meet and discuss?

MR. RICHARDS: Member Ames, as Mr. Luna had mentioned, the staff will continue working to provide some more information. We put that meeting or scheduled that meeting as a placeholder in the event that we have that ready, and I would defer to Mr. Luna as to whether or not that information will be ready or any information will be ready to warrant a second meeting.

But we did want to go ahead -- under the Open Meetings Act, we had to get it posted for a follow-up meeting as soon as next week. So Mr. Luna?

MR. LUNA: Roland Luna, VTR Division Director.

David is exactly right, John. What we were trying to do

is make sure that we planned in advance in the event that 1 there were particular questions that the Committee had about any of our developments, whether it's with rule --3 with our rule development or with programming. 4 5 If there were specific questions that you had, 6 we wanted to make sure that we allowed enough time for the 7 dissection of any of our components of the Implementation 8 Plan. So it was more of a placeholder. 9 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Roland. Members, any 10 other questions or comments that you'd like to make at the current time? 11 12 MR. CAVENDER: Member Cavender. Quick 13 clarification, if I may? 14 MR. RICHARDS: Yes, sir, Member Cavender. 15 right ahead. 16 MR. CAVENDER: Yes. As we're reading the wording of the Senate Bill 876, primarily, how is the 17 language "willing to accept an application" to be 18 19 interpreted? It just doesn't sound very specific. 20 Who makes that decision? Is it the TAC? who makes the decision on that? 21 22 MR. RICHARDS: I will defer to VTR staff. 2.3 Luna? 24 MR. THOMPSON: Clint Thompson, Deputy Director, 25 Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. That's

certainly something, Member Cavender -- that's certainly 1 something that we're working through with the development of the rules. 3 4 Ultimately, what we've come to at this point, 5 is, yes, it is at the discretion of the county tax 6 assessor-collector whether or not they are willing to 7 process those transactions, but that will be developed 8 through the rule process. 9 Thank you, sir. MR. CAVENDER: 10 MR. THOMPSON: Yes, sir. MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Clint. Any other 11 questions, members, for VTR staff, or comments? 12 13 (No response.) 14 MR. RICHARDS: Hearing none, I'm going to move 15 on, then, to Agenda Item No. 3, public comment, and ask 16 our legal assistant, Tameka, are there any comments from 17 the public? And I have heard from her. There are no public comments that have been made at this time. 18 19 Moving on in the agenda, we come to Agenda Item 20 No. 4, adjournment. Unless there's any further business 21 to conduct, I'd entertain a motion to adjourn today's 22 meeting from one of the members. 2.3 MR. AMES: Mr. Richards, John Ames here. Prior

to our adjournment, if I may ask, again, we have another

meeting scheduled for next Wednesday. If there's not

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going to be significant additional information for this
one item on the agenda, should that meeting be rescheduled
to a future date?

MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Presiding Officer

Ames. Yes, we will reschedule it, if the determination is
made in the next day or so that that meeting will not need

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to take place.

I'll defer to VTR, the Division Director and staff, as to whether or not they have that information. But just as soon as we know, we will let everybody know, because we know you have busy schedules and don't want to conflict with those.

So -- but to answer your question, if we don't have that information ready, yes, we will reschedule and we'll let all the Committee members know that we are rescheduling and for which date. So --

MR. AMES: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Richards. I just want to be mindful of everybody's time on this Committee.

MR. RICHARDS: As do we. Right, right.

MR. AMES: There's a lot of people on here who have a lot of obligations. And I definitely want this Committee to be a useful committee and be able to provide great impact and feedback to the DMV in this rulemaking process. But I also don't want to meet just for the

1	purpose of meeting, so
2	MR. RICHARDS: Oh, absolutely. We hear you
3	loud and clear. Any other questions or comments from the
4	membership?
5	(No response.)
6	MR. RICHARDS: Hearing none, I'll entertain a
7	motion to adjourn.
8	MR. CAVENDER: I would move to adjourn. Member
9	Cavender.
10	MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Member Cavender. Is
11	there a second?
12	MR. AMES: Second. Member Ames.
13	MR. RICHARDS: Thank you, Member Ames. All in
14	favor, say aye.
15	(A chorus of ayes.)
16	MR. RICHARDS: All right. Thank you very much,
17	members, for meeting today. Thank you very much for your
18	service.
19	We look forward to continuing this dialogue and
20	working with each of you to address Senate Bill 876. Have
21	a great rest of your day and great weekend ahead, and
22	we'll be in touch.
